Giving Purpose to Our Work

"And now, a word from our sponsor." I was asked to deliver remarks on behalf of The Jewish Agency for Israel at the upcoming finals of the Chidon HaTanach—the US National Bible Contest for Jewish Youth—whose winner will go on to next year's international competition in Israel. It's one of those miscellanies that depart from the regular rhythm of the job, and this one is, for me, a kick. Though I have a deep love of the Torah's text, I have nothing of the mastery of the text that the contestants in this competition have. So I've been challenged to think of some remarks that will fulfill my role in delivering greetings from the sponsor that will convey a bit of what The Jewish Agency does, while having some relevance to these young Torah prodigies.

At the risk that this edition of the JCSA newsletter will come out in advance of the event on May 5, I want to share a bit of what I will say:

Why does the Jewish Agency sponsor the Chidon HaTanach? It is because everything we do follows from the narrative of the Tanach—the forging of the Jewish people and their quest for redemption in the Land of Israel. If Avraham left his family in "Lekh Lekha," Jews today continue to leave their families to make Aliyah. If Moshe rescued Jews from slavery in Egypt, today The Jewish Agency continues to rescue Jews from danger in Islamic lands. If Ezra and Nechemiah responded to a world in which Jews were straying from their heritage and intermarrying by making the rebirth of a Jewish homeland in Israel a clarion call to return, so do we today through programs like Masa. If the Torah exhorted the Israelites to care for their poor and their orphans when they entered the Land, so the Agency must continue today to provide opportunity to youth at risk. And if Yonah went forth to bring redemption to those of another nation, so too we today.

This exercise of writing for the Chidon HaTanach ceremony turns out to be a timely opportunity to reflect how my work, the work of my organization, advances the mission that God set forth for the Jewish people. It is timely because, about ten days after the Chidon HaTanach is Shavuot, the day we commemorate receiving the gift of Torah. And so, I commend the exercise to you; I wish we could do it together. Which of our organizations learn from Ruth's determination to make our people her people, to embrace the convert? Which of our organizations are prepared, like Devorah the Judge, to confront foes, or like Nathan the prophet, to confront those in our own community who do wrong? Which of our organizations hear the desperation of Rachel or Hannah to have children, and give comfort and solutions to those in our community who face infertility. Which of our organizations are prepared as David to slay giants—to take on issues that seem too large? Which of our organizations, like Jeremiah, give voice to the suffering of our people? Which of our organizations renew Jewish life as Hezekiah? Which of our organizations give leadership to the societies around us as Joseph or Mordecai?

As we prepare for Shavuot—*zman matan Toratein*, the time of the giving of our Torah—I realize that if we did the exercise together—if we stopped to consider all that our diverse organizations do and the precedents and values that represents—we would find that, every day, we write the Torah anew with our deeds, word by word. For us, each day, is zman matan Torateinu.


